

Trapped... in our school library

As the back cover blurb for *Tahn* tells us, the title character of this novel by L. A. Kelly (newly available to Grades 7 and 8) “is trapped in the middle of a conflict between two noble families.” Forced by his master “to kidnap Lady Netta of the House of Trillet,” Tahn must reconcile his conscience with the welfare of the Lady and of a group of children. This historical novel, set in the Middle Ages, is the first of a trilogy.

MUSIC NOTES!



Term of the Week: Oiseaux Exotique – (Exotic Birds) is a ballet by Canadian Composer Harry Freedman (1922-2005) who was born in Poland and grew up in Winnipeg. He later moved to Toronto. His ballet *Rose Latulippe* premiered by the Royal Winnipeg Ballet in 1966 was the first-ever Canadian ballet. *Oiseaux Exotiques* was composed for the Nation Ballet of Canada in 1984. The ballet comprises different Latin American dances for various birds. (WSO Adventures in Music Teacher’s Guide).

Kindergarten (Mrs. Nyhof): Next week we will learn Old Mother Brown, creating movements and playing a guessing game. The children are enjoying these game-like songs and creating movement with their bodies.

Grade 1-3: We will start the Finale of the music of *The Twins and the Monster*. This lesson will focus on identifying the main melodic motif.

Grade 4: This week we started listening to the music for the WSO concert. We started with exploring *Conga from Oiseaux Exotiques* by Canadian Composer Harry Freedman. Next week Wednesday we will finish that and start learning about *Three Dances from CAPRIOL Suite* by English composer Peter Warlock.

Grade 5: Due to wrap-up day we didn’t have music this week. Next time (March 5) we will learn *Liza Jane* and focus on chords I-V.

Grade 6: On March 6 we will start listening to the music for the WSO concert. We’ll start learning about *Three Dances from CAPRIOL Suite* by English composer Peter Warlock.

Grade 7: We are focusing on creating music on unusual instruments. We are transcribing (notate sounds) a piece of percussion music.

Memory Work: Song: Ps.95:1 (due on Thursday) Text—Exodus 20:12-17 (due on Thursday)

Church History/Bible History: We will finish learning about the missionary John Eliot and do a review and a quiz. After that we will get back into our Bible History unit about Israel at Mount Sinai.

ELA: We are finished publishing our research about our structures. We are continuing to learn about how to read non-fiction books as well and right now we are doing a book about glaciers. We have found out a lot about the features of a non-fiction book such as table of contents, headings, glossaries, diagrams, labels, and captions. We will also be answering comprehension questions and doing vocabulary exercises.

Word Wall Words: It is only a 4 day week next week so we will have 4 words: **whole, hole, weather, whether**

Working With Words spelling lists: We have a 4 day week, however, we will still have our regular weekly spelling test on Thursday instead of Friday.. We will fit in a bit of extra practice during the week, and don't forget to practice at home as well if you think you need extra practice.

Math: We are practicing division as grouping right now by doing some acting out of division sentences as well as drawing pictures. We are also learning about how multiplication and division are the inverse of each other. As well, we are continuing to practice our math facts (multiplication, addition and subtraction) to build our fluency with this.

Science: We drew pictures of imaginary buildings and labelled them with building materials that would be the most effective for building. We will also do some work yet with blueprints and noticing geometry in our environment.

Art: We have nearly finished our 3D houses! It has taken us a long time to add all the details since we were only allowed to use paper to make everything. We also looked at a wide variety of windows and doors to give us different ideas about how to draw and decorate them.

Math: We are working through our unit on data management. So far we have learned how to read and write venn diagrams and carroll diagrams. Next week we will work with pictographs and bar graphs.


Science: We are beginning our unit on sound. Next week we will learn more about how sound travels and reacts to different materials.

ELA: Next week we'll read chapters 3 and 4 of *Sign on the Beaver*. Students will be responding to the reading selections in a variety of ways to be shared with their classmates in small groups. We also have a few more booktalks to finish. Students must prepare and practice their performance as it will be video recorded.

Bible History: Presently students are working on group projects in which they'll teach a Bible story to their classmates.

Science 5/6: In class we continue to experiment with physical and chemical changes. We have also been focusing on lab safety and skills.

Math: In math we're working with ratios and equivalent ratios.

Social Studies: Grade 6 has been working on a final World War 2 project. They've been creating Blitz Art to show the bombing of London during the Blitz. There will be a Unit Test on **Thursday, March 1st**.



Grade 7/8:



French 7: The students will be presenting their menu assignments on Monday. They will have a quiz on seasons and weather on Wednesday.

Math 7: In our "Operations with fractions" unit we first "activated our prior knowledge" of fractions and how they work. Then we used models to add some. We'll move on to adding and subtracting fractions numerically/symbolically next week.

ELA 7: We continue learning about research and the inquiry process. This week students finished their work on the annotated bibliography and formulated a big question. Next week students will work on an outline and create a thesis statement that answers their big question.

RefSt 7: We completed our unit on Isaac yesterday with a test. Next week, we're switching to a church History topic "The Worldwide Church".

SocSt 7: This week focused on Lesson 2 "Democratic Rights and Responsibilities." Students will complete their timeline of voting rights in Canada next week, and complete activities relating to Lesson 3: Levels of Government in Canada.

Science 7: We will have a chapter nine test on Tuesday. We will then start chapter ten.

PhysEd 7/8: We will have a short floor hockey unit this week.

Science 8: Chapter nine tests will be returned early in the week. We will be spending some time on a science fair style project.

ELA 8: PLEASE respond to the Permission Click regarding our trip to MITT on Thursday, March 1.

"Daily Three" became our routine once again. After a bumpy start, students are well on their way! **Reading:** Some students have already finished a book, and moved onto another. It's okay if others need more time to read their book. The goal is that by the end of this three week block students will have read at least one book, completed three role sheets and attended three meetings to discuss the book they're reading. **Word Work** next week will focus on lesson 15 in Spelling. Students are making a board game as a culminating activity/**writing** assignment based on one of the novels they are reading.

Math 8: Thurs: QUIZ on Solving Equations Involving Fractions (Chapter 6).

SocSt 8: We are continuing our introduction to the Transition to the Modern World (ca. 500-1400). Students are working on creating a timeline of the main world events. Students have collected the data for their section and have made a storyboard. We are now starting the process of making it into an animation.

French 8: We will have a quiz on Part B of the lexique on Wednesday.

Gospels/Acts gr. 9: Pairs presenting on “Time Period of Christ’s Birth.”

Social Studies 10F: More Heritage Fair work, then next assignment on “Governance in Canada.

Business Innovations 10S: Starting our unit on **Business in the Economy**. Hoping for visits from business owners (or to McDonald’s?).

French 10F: We will be looking at the verb *boire*, as well as some other irregular verbs forms.
