PRINCIPAL'S NEWS:

The first week of our new semester is now behind us. For our upper grades, it always takes a few days for the dust to settle in order for us to get a better understanding of which classes they are in. Each year it happens that students are more optimistic in their course selection and by the time the second semester comes around, they lose some of their zeal and start to alleviate their schedule. I'm thankful for the students who took the time to meet with Mrs. Dykstra to ensure they were making informed decisions with their courses in order to ensure they make wise decisions that will not hamper their plans for after ICS.

From time to time I have parents wonder if our course offerings or our course delivery favours our more academic students or our weaker students, or perhaps whether we are taking too much of a middling approach. These are useful discussions to have in order to work to ensure that our education does properly prepare our students for their future studies and employment. One of the unique things about Manitoba's education system is that there is very little streaming of courses. Other provinces, such as Ontario, have multiple levels for the same classes so that students in Grade 9 can either take Academic English or Applied English, or in Grade 11 they can choose from University English, College English, or Workplace English. In Manitoba however, only one English, Social Studies, Science etc. course exists for each grade. As a result, the teacher has to teach the content of the course in such a way that the content is relevant for all students and prepares them all suitably for their future plans. Differentiation is an important strategy for accomplishing this in a classroom but this too is complicated in trying to ensure that students take the appropriate path rather than the path of least resistance. The danger is then that we take a middling approach to education. The one exception to this is math which starting in Grade 9 starts to stream students. Here too though, as our world becomes increasingly reliant on technology, many programs are demanding higher level math courses and so students are still left struggling through these courses in order to keep their options open. Lest you think though that Manitoba is somehow backwards compared to Ontario, the streaming debate is one hotly debated across the world and the streaming philosophy is under attack (just google 'streaming curriculum debate'). Opponents point out that it perpetuates inequalities and the benefits to the spectrum of learners is up for debate. Regardless, we work within the system we have in place here in Manitoba and we will continue to try to do our utmost to support all our covenant children in their education. We pray that the education students receive here will provide them the necessary academic, spiritual and social foundation for their future endeavours.

This past week was our first week of "I Love to Read" Month. By now many will know that our theme is "Get on Board & Read" with board games as our theme. On Monday students enjoyed a D.E.A.R. day and an opening assembly. The students have been challenged to read 2700 hours before the end of the month. If they manage to accomplish that goal Mrs. Veenendaal and I will have to spend the day wearing handcuffs! On Tuesday students had to guess which books were read over the PA system. On Wednesday the elementary students painted all the murals of board games created by the Grade 6 students. Thursday was board game afternoon and we even had lots of guests and even 'game experts' to come play games with our students in the afternoons. Although the goal of the month is reading, we'd be quite happy if we got some students hooked on board games too! Today is Guest Reader afternoon. Thanks to all those who volunteered their time to come and read to our students. They love it!



MUSIC NOTES!

Term of the Week - Word Rhythm Compositions - Rhythm (from Greek rhythmos is "any regular



recurring motion, symmetry" (Liddell and Scott 1996)) generally means a "movement or procedure with uniform or patterned recurrence of a beat, accent, or the like." (dictionary.com) The Orff approach to music uses speech to learn, identify and write rhythms. Using the syllables of words a *Word Rhythm Composition* allows students to create new rhythms. Choose a theme that relates to a song and create rhythms using

those words. For example on the theme of sports in the Winter Olympics we have words such as: skiing, speed skating, figure skating, luge, etc.

Kindergarten: Mrs. Nyhof: Due to I love to read month, we didn't get many music classes in this week. We did have fun "working at a factory", keeping the beat with our hands, feet and head. Next week we'll learn "Curly Joe" and playing a guessing game where students have to sing a mini solo.

Grade 1-3: Our next theme from *The Twins and the Monster* is *Azizi's Quest*. This lesson will focus on the form, tempo, dynamics, musical articulation, and movement. Through listening and movement we will be able to identify the different sections of the music.

Grade 4: We learned *Bill Grogan's Goat*. Due to the six day schedule the next music class is on Tuesday, February 20. We will learn *Topnotcher*.

Grade 5: We created our own word rhythm compositions and transferred these to body percussion and movement. We created a Rondo with song *Winter Olympics*. as the main theme and our rhythms. Next week we will learn *Button you must wander*.

Grade 6: This week we had a shortened music class due to the Art Afternoon we explored rhythm. Next week we will learn *One Bottle of Pop*.

Band 8-10: We continue to work on pieces for the Spring Program. **Due Tuesday, February 13:** Music Theory p. 9-11 and Music History p. 46-47.

Bible/Church History: This week read a few parables Jesus told the crowds who followed him when he was on earth. We also read about how the disciples were afraid when Jesus rebuked the storm and the waters AND everything immediately stopped. We discussed that it is important to have a respectful "fear of the Lord."

ELA: Students continue to work on improving their skill in reading, including comprehension, as well as writing.

Math: We are continuing our unit on patterning. During our daily "morning work" time students work on mastering numeracy skills.

Science: This week the class tested various objects to see how buoyant they are. As scientists do, students hypothesized whether an object would sink or float. Each student then had a turn to test their hypothesis by dropping the object into a bin of water.

Gym: We are continuing our unit on stick/ball/puck handling and floor hockey.

We've had a great first week for "I Love to Read" month and we especially enjoyed board game afternoon! Keep up the good work with collecting and keeping track of reading minutes in your reading logs! ⁽²⁾

Memory Work: Song - Ps. 65:1; Text - Ex 20:7-11

Church History: We are working on a Church History unit about how God uses people from all times and places. We have finished learning about Rev. de Cock and next we will be learning about the life of the missionary John Eliot.

ELA: We are working on publishing our pieces of descriptive writing about our structures. We are looking at different ways to present and publish our writing by using *The Important Book* by Margaret Wise Brown for inspiration and ideas. We are also working on editing and publishing our research reports about our structures.

Working With Words spelling lists: We have a regular 5 day week--new word lists for each group will be in your child's agenda for extra practice at home.

Math: We have been continuing to practice our multiplication facts. So far we have gotten very good at the 2x tables and we are now working on getting better at the 3x tables. We are also working on division and have been acting out division stories as well as drawing pictures to show our understanding. So far we are working on learning about division as sharing, and later we will learn about division as grouping. **Science:** We have recorded one of our experiments about the strength of different types of paper, and we will now work on learning about making and testing different kinds of joints. As well we will be finding out about how to brace shapes (like squares, triangles etc) in order to make them stronger.

Art: We have been linking some of our writing about structures with art. We also need to work on finishing our 3D houses.

Church History: This week students were introduced to some new vocabulary, including: persecution, oppression, blasphemy and martyrs. God is truly good to give us faith, faith that made the martyrs willing to die for what they believed in. Students can plan to write their unit test on **Thursday, Feb 22nd**. **ELA:** Students have been working on their Splash Organizers for their Book Writes! It is exciting to see some of their ideas growing! Next students will begin their rough drafts, focussing on organizing their work so it makes sense! We have also begun a Listen to Reading unit. Students have been enjoying

listening to the reading of *Island of the Blue Dolphins* by Scott O'Dell!

Spelling: Lesson 18 Work and Test due **Friday, February 16**th. Some students are exempt from this assignment but should still be encouraged to practice their words for the test!

Unit 18 Assignment: OP #3 & 5: Some students need a reminder to copy their list words carefully from the textbook while they are writing out their answers in their assignments. Many students are writing down the correct word, but spelling it incorrectly. Since this is a spelling assignment, these answers are considered wrong and students will lose marks for words spelt incorrectly. Please encourage your child to double check the spelling of their list words.

Unit 18 List Words: *known, matches, science, dangerous, furniture, objects, special, geography, picture, knives, treasures, possible, addresses, mountain, beginning, millions*

Social Studies: Students have begun learning an overview of World War 2. Some have asked questions about specific events, and it is wonderful to see their curiosity! We will have time throughout this unit to get deep into some of their areas of interest!

Memory Work: Psalm 106:1

Spelling: Lesson 17 – Base words and Endings. Remember to make all corrections from lesson 16. Define the following words and use them in a sentence (minimum 10 words in each sentence): pitied, published, illustrated, denied, and comic. Observing Patterns: 1-3; Discovering Patterns: 1-3; Exploring Patterns: 1, 2, 4; Challenges with Words: 1a OR 2.

ELA: This week we introduced our novel study, *Sign on the Beaver*. Students will be responding to the reading selections in a variety of ways to be shared with their classmates.

Bible History: Presently we're studying *Jesus teaches His disciples to pray*. Next we'll look at "Jesus shows the way to Heaven" in Matthew 7. Hopefully we'll have a test on Thursday.

Grade 5/6 Science: Presently we're exploring changes in matter.

Math: In math we're compared mixed numbers and improper fractions by finding a common denominator and using a number line.



Grade 7/8:

ELA 7: We continue the research and inquiry process. The field trip to the Millennium Library was a success. We learned about the library system and how to find sources. After that the students had time to search for sources for their heritage fair projects. Next week we will work on an annotated bibliography for our heritage fair project. We will use this to explain why we choose a source and how it relates to the topic.

Art 7: We are focusing on creating music on unusual instruments. We are transcribing (notate sounds) a piece of percussion music.

Science 7: Chapter eight tests will be returned early in the week. We will be looking at how energy is transferred in chapter nine.

RefSt 7: We only had one class this week. In it we studied how Jacob finally left Laban. Next week we'll cover the last events of this unit which are based on of Genesis 32- 35. There will be a test the following Wednesday, February 20 (Due to Louis Riel Day).

Soc St 7: Our unit on human rights ended with a test today. Next week we'll begin learning about democracy and government. We'll use chapter 6 in our text *The World Today* to begin with.

Math 7: This week students learned how to find the area of a parallelogram and triangle. They'll learn how to calculate the area of a circle next week. There will be a test on using these formulas on <u>Friday</u>, <u>February 16</u>.

French 7: There will be a quiz on Tuesday on the words from Lesson 10. We will continue our look at weather and the seasons.

PE 7/8: We will wrap up our basketball unit this week.

French 8: We continue with our look at the past tense, as well as the verb voir.

SocSt 8: We are continuing our unit on the Transition to the Modern World (ca. 500-1400). We are using an online program called Canva to make a storyboard. We'll put all the sections together to create a timeline of world events.

ELA 8: Students worked on their essay based on *Cue for Treason* this past week. The final draft is due on <u>Tuesday, February 13</u>. We also spent some time preparing for our theme assembly on "Whatever is Just" which we'll present next Friday, February 16. We will continue with that next week, but students will also complete the activities in Spelling Lesson 14 in addition to reading in their chosen novel.

Science 8: There will be a chapter nine test early next week. We will then move on to a new unit dealing with water and some of the properties of water.

Math 8: Fri. – TEST on Percent, Ratios and Rates (Chapter 5).

HIGH SCHOOL DIVISION:

Careers 9: A speaker from *The Duke of Edinburgh Awards Program* visited our class on Monday. Ask your son/daughter about it. If you have any questions feel free to email me. Today was our in- school career fair. Next week students will see how they did at the fair. The next topic in Career Exploration is "Working Conditions". Students will complete an assignment based on this, and then evaluate a few job search websites. If time, students will receive a period to work on their portfolios which must include finalizing their resume. Final schedule and details will be given in class.
